1874.

On the 27th of May, 1874, Mr. William Holden was engaged to catalogue the books in the Library, under the direction of the State Librarian. He went to work at once. At this time there were in the Library 33,007 books, pamphlets, etc., exclusive of any property connected with the Law Library. The accessions during the year, or the time occupied in completing the catalogue, were 757 volumes, according to the Librarian's report for 1875.

The report of 1873 represented in the General Department as registered 33,007 volumes, and in the Law Department 5,632 volumes; aggregate registered November 15, 1873, 38,639. Since that date to November 15, 1874, the total additions were 1,016.

1875.

The cataloguing of the books, pamphlets, papers, etc., contained in the Ohio State Library, which was entered upon by Mr. William Holden, assisted by Miss M. C. Harbaugh, Assistant Librarian, was commenced on the 27th of May, 1874, and completed and placed in the hands of the printers on the 1st of September, 1875, having been engaged on the work a year and a quarter.

The Legislature authorized one thousand volumes of the work to be printed, which was executed with dispatch by Nevins & Myers, and in a style of typography very commendable. The binding was executed at the bindery of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, under the direction of Capt. M. C. Lilley, Superintendent of the bindery, and of Mr. C. B. Flood, Supervisor of Public Printing. As to the character of the new catalogue—its plan, simplicity and completeness—it is expressed in a liberal criticism by the editor of the State Journal, in its issue of December 28, 1875, from which this extract is made:

"The plan of this catalogue is the simplest and the most concise, yet complete, that we are acquainted with. Each work is entered under *author*, *title* and *subject*; the whole being arranged in a single alphabetical series. The inquirer need only know his author's name to be able to turn instantly to the name of the book he requires, if it is in the library. If the name of the author has escaped him, he may turn to the title of the work. If he has forgotten that, he may consult the index for the general subject of his investigation, and find both the author and the title of his book, and also those of all other writers on the subject whose works appear on the shelves of our State Library. Nor is this all. In the same place with the author's name, the title of his book, and the subject of its contents, he will find the precise case in the library where the book is to be found, and the very shelf of the library on which it belongs. So that any absolute stranger, with nothing more than the general knowledge of the arrangement of the cases, may go into the library and, with this book in his hand, may, in one minute, find any one of the volumes on its shelves.

"It seems to us one could not reasonably require more than this in any catalogue. The mechanical department is worthy of praise. The execution is much superior to that of the ordinary run of State work. The paper is excellent; the types are exceedingly clear; the work is remarkably free from annoying typographical errors, and the binding of the copy before us is superb."

This new catalogue does *not* include the six thousand and odd volumes that comprise the Law Library. While the labor of cataloguing was progressing, the question of including the books of the Law Library in this catalogue was raised, and was referred to Attorney-General Little, who responded on the 18th of August in a letter to the board, that "by the act of February 16, 1867, the Law Library was recognized as a separate and distinct department from the State Library, and was not, therefore, to be included." The total cost of the catalogue is here set forth: For paper,

\$1,040; printing, \$1,518.66; cataloguing, \$2,000; binding, \$1,150; total cost, \$5,708.66.

The Legislature, conceding that the facilities for light in the Library Room were greatly defective, and that a material enlargement was essential, made an appropriation at its session in 1875 of \$3,309.77 for that purpose, and authorized the work to be done by contract. Proposals were issued on the ninth day of June, 1875, and publication made in accordance with special statute, based on the plans, specifications and estimates of Tinsley & Cook, architects and superintendents. Their estimate of the total cost of the work, when completed, was put at \$3,300. After the close of the advertised period, it was found by the board that but one bid was offered for the work, that of J. Gill Blain, with M. C. Blain, Windsor Atcheson and John T. Blain as bondsmen. This proposal, with the names of the sureties, being referred to Attorney-General Little, he gave it his official approval, and the contract was closed. The obligation of the contractor was, in brief, for the sum of \$2,950 to complete the work according to the specifications, "to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, on or before the first day of November, 1875," and bore date of July 30, 1875. In the event of the failure to complete it by the time specified, the contractor was obligated "to forfeit and pay to the State of Ohio the sum of ten dollars per day for each and every day thereafter until all such work was finished and completed." About six weeks after the contract was ratified, the entire interior of the main Library, from floor to ceiling, was given up to the demands of the contractor, who proceeded to erect an elaborate scaffolding, which practically closed the Library from public access and use for a long time.

During all this long interval, no progress of the work was made. When November 1st came, the day of its obligated completion, nothing had been done, although on the authority of the board, the architect had, by verbal and written admonitions, urged it forward. It was not till the first day of December, 1875, that the workmen entered to begin a job that was to have been completed a full month before.

The last report represented as registered in the General Department 33,765 volumes and in the Law Department 5,890 volumes; in both departments November 15, 1874, 39,655 volumes. From that date to November 15, 1875, the total additions were 953 volumes.

Seventeen hundred volumes, bound and in pamphlet form, were forwarded in 1875 to State and Territorial Libraries, historical and scientific societies, colleges, etc.

1876.

At the date of the annual report of the library board for 1875, the work of remodeling the ceiling of the main department, which was intended to result in better light and healthier ventilation, had not been completed, and the entire interior was virtually inaccessible to the public. The work was finally completed, and in such an artistic manner as to meet with the unqualified approval of the board, as well as to challenge admiration from all visitors, citizens and strangers. The Ohio State Library was now claimed to be at the head of all the State libraries in the Union.

The appropriation of two hundred dollars for that purpose covered all the expense of dusting every book in the main library, and most of those deposited in the document rooms.

The system which was adopted in preparing the catalogue for publication being regarded by the most critical judges the simplest and best of all that were in use among the leading libraries of the country, it was considered expedient to continue the system as a preparatory labor for future use, when it might be deemed advisable in the interests of the library to issue a new edition of that very complete volume. This special labor was made one of the particular duties at that time of the assistant librarian, Miss M. C. Harbaugh.

1877.

The State Library increased in 1877, two thousand and sixty-eight volumes.

The character of the books, collected during the official terms of a dozen different librarians, was of a very high order, the intrinsic value in proportion to the number, being very high.

About one hundred and fifty volumes and bound pamphlets, many of them scarce, relating to money, gold and silver, paper currency and credit, labor and capital, taxation, wages, and kindred subjects of political science, were secured. In addition, especial attention was given to the collection of books—now largely out of print, and becoming scarcer and dearer every year—relating to the history of the great west, and to the war between the States.

1878.

The Ohio State Library increased in 1878, two thousand four hundred and fifty volumes, including about four hundred pamphlets, largely historical, bound separately.

The value of the Library, for its number, is high. It being in so great a degree a Library for reference and consultation, only a few novels are on its shelves—those generally of the best—and it escapes the buying of duplicates and dozens even of popular books for the hour, as is required in the large public libraries.

1880.

During the session of 1880, an appropriation was made to remodel, re-shelve, and otherwise improve the room in which the bound volumes of daily newspapers and numerous periodicals are kept. These improvements were made, and done in an artistic and substantial manner.

The Library Board thus speaks of

THE ST. CLAIR PAPERS:

"During the session of the Legislature of 1870, a resolution was passed 'To purchase for the use of the State, at a cost not to exceed two thousand dollars, to be expended at the discretion of the Governor and State Librarian, the correspondence, messages, documents and manuscripts, generally, of Arthur St. Clair, Governor of the Northwest Territory for fourteen years, from 1788 to 1802.'"

In compliance with this resolution, these manuscripts were purchased, and placed in the custody of the State Librarian. These documents are of great historical value. They serve to illustrate two periods of pre-eminent interest in the history of our country; the first embracing the Revolutionary epoch, and the second that in which the government of the Northwest Territory was organized and administered by St. Clair—a period of fourteen years (1788 to 1802)—extending almost from the passage of the "Ordinance" to the founding of the State government.

The papers relating to the Revolutionary war are especially rich in unpublished autograph letters from General Washington, the Marquis de Lafayette, Baron Steuben, General Green, and other celebrated Revolutionary leaders.

It has been a matter of surprise to all who have examined the collection to find that it contains forty-four letters from General Washington alone, relating to the Southern New York, New Jersey and Virginia Revolutionary campaigns, besides a number treating of the affairs of the Northwest Territory.

These letters, on examination and comparison with the published writings and correspondence of Washington, edited by Jared Sparks and collected in nine octavo volumes, are found to fill gaps in that correspondence, and to elucidate more than one dark problem in our early history.

The great bulk of the St. Clair manuscripts treats of the administration of the government of the Territory, and reflects its history with a fidelity and accuracy no where else to be found.

The Commissioners for that year add the following suggestions and recommendations:

"Ohio is fortunate in possessing these official documents upon her early territorial period, and should not delay to secure them against the certain destruction which awaits them unless speedily cared for.

"When acquired by the State, it was at once seen that the papers had been so exposed that many valuable letters existed only in fragments, and were with difficulty compiled and arranged. It behooves the State, therefore, to publish the collection in book form for a twofold purpose: first, for the preservation of valuable yet perishable documents, and second, to render the historical facts contained in them accessible.

"There would doubtless be little difficulty in finding a publisher for a volume of *selected letters*, such as those which illustrate the revolutionary period, including the letters of Washington, but this would leave neglected and in a perishable condition the greater part of the collection, and that part which especially pertains to our territorial history.

"We would recommend that a suitable appropriation be made to publish the collection, as a whole, and that they be not left a prey, to be carried off piece-meal by seekers after literary curiosities."

1881.

The following from the report of the Library Commissioners gives an idea of the transactions for the year 1881:

A great many old, obsolete, uninteresting volumes lumber the Library shelves, that are never called for. They are simply incumbrances. We have duplicates and triplicates of material that interest nobody, and we ask the privilege to sell what, in our judgment, occupies space that can be more sensibly used, and to apply the result of the sale for the benefit of the Library.

There are now over eight thousand volumes in the Library not contained in the published catalogue. The Librarian believes that he has authority under the law to issue a supplemental catalogue, and for the benefit of the public he will do so, unless interdicted by the Legislature.

The last Legislature very properly, in our judgment, increased the salary of Miss Mary Harbaugh, from one thousand to twelve hundred dollars, but failed to make an appropriation to meet the obligation to her, and we ask respectfully that provision be made in this case.

The St. Clair papers will, we expect, under contract, be soon ready for delivery to this Legislature. The publication of them was given to Robert Clarke & Co., of Cincinnati, they being the lowest bidders, contracting to do the work for \$2,250.00, and furnishing five hundred copies to the State free of charge. The editing of them was assigned to Hon. William Henry Smith (ex Secretary of State, and now collector of the Chicago Port), because he was capable, and on account of his long, patient and able investigations of the subject, and because he had papers of importance and interest in his hands which no other one possessed, or could without great trouble or expense obtain, he was better qualified to give a history of that man, and the great North-west during St. Clair's career than any person we knew. From the examination thus far of the work, we believe that it will gratify every student of American History, and perpetuate the name of the author, as a grand illustrator of the merits of a man who has been so frequently denounced. The editing of the book was done by Mr. Smith without charge, and he is entitled to the thanks of the people of the State.

1883.

The Library Commissioners' Report for 1883, under date of December 20 of that year, contains the following paragraphs:

"The Library now contains 50,380 volumes since the close of the year 1882. In the purchase of books during the year, an effort was made to select such literature as would add to the already high character of the Library as a reference library, and increase its value to the people of the State as a repository of scientific, historical and biographical works, not ordinarily found in private or circulating libraries.

"An appropriation for furniture made by the General Assembly at its last session, has enabled us to materially improve the Library and newspaper rooms, both in appearance and accommodations for the public.

"Provision was made by the General Assembly in January last, for the publication of a supplemental catalogue of the Library, which had

been prepared by Miss Mary C. Harbaugh, Assistant Librarian. We have received a portion of the bound volumes, and distributed the same in accordance with the provisions of the above mentioned act. The remaining volumes will be distributed as soon as received at the Library.

"A complete list of the books placed in the Library during the year, and also a financial statement giving an exhibit in detail of the Library receipts from all sources, and the disbursements on account of the same are submitted herewith."

FROM THE COMMISSIONERS' REPORT, DATED NOVEMBER 16, 1886.

"An effort has been made during the year 1886, to add very considerably to the department of Western History, and to bring several other important lines of literature up to the present date by the purchase of the latest volumes attainable.

"An effort is being made by the Librarian to secure a complete file of all the newspapers published in Ohio, in order that a record of current history may be kept at a central point, accessible to all persons. The adequate accommodation of these newspapers will require an enlargement of the newspaper room of the State Library, and it is hoped that such an extension will be authorized by the Legislature.

"It is also urged that an appropriation for the printing of a supplementary catalogue be made. There has been no printed catalogue since 1882, and the general usefulness of the State Library is seriously impaired by the lack of one containing the books purchased since that date."

TO THE

ARTHUR ST. CLAIR PAPERS.

At the session of the Legislature of 1870, a resolution was passed, "To purchase, for the use of the State Library, the correspondence, messages, documents and manuscripts generally of Arthur St. Clair, Governor of the Northwest territory for fourteen years, from 1788 to 1802; to be expended at the discretion of the Governor and State Librarian, a sum sufficient for that purpose not exceeding two thousand dollars."

The papers were purchased for two thousand dollars, and are now deposited in the library. They have been classified and arranged as well as time would permit, and have as a guide to the entire lot, the following indexes:

INDEX No. 1 is to copies of letters written by Arthur St. Clair—No. 1 to 207—with the dates in order, and the names to whom directed; and are put in boxes 10 and 11 in new large envelopes, numbered as the letters.

INDEX No. 2 is to letters addressed to Arthur St. Clair—No. 1 to 401; same arrangement as Index No. 1, and are placed in boxes 12, 13, 14 and 15.

INDEX No. 3 is a general index to miscellaneous papers of the same purchase, and are placed in envelopes and portfolios, in boxes Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9.

Beside the contents of these fifteen boxes, there are four large volumes, on the blank pages of which about five hundred letters and other papers have been pasted, and an index made to each volume.

[Beside the manuscripts referred to in the following indexes, there are four large bound volumes, on the blank pages of which are pasted some hundreds of letters and other matter belonging to the same purchase of St. Clair manuscript papers, each volume having its own index.]

OHIO STATE LIBRARY RULES AND RESTRICTIONS.

HOURS.

The Ohio State Library is open every day, except Sundays and the usual legal holidays.

During the session of the Legislature, from nine o'clock A. M. till twelve M.; from two P. M. to five P. M.; and from seven P. M. to nine P. M.

After the adjournment of the Legislature, from nine A. M. till twelve M., and from two to five P. M.

REGULATIONS.

All persons are permitted to visit the Library, and examine and read the books and magazines.

Those who are entitled to take out books are—

By law:

Members and officers and ex-members of the Legislature;
State officers and clerks in the several departments;
The Judges of the Supreme Court and Courts of Common Pleas;
Superintendents in the benevolent and other State institutions.

By resolution:

Resident ministers in the city of Columbus have, by a resolution of the General Assembly, free use of the Library, in accordance with the rules, who are at the time pastors of congregations, and who apply in person for books for their own special use.

The privilege of drawing books from the Library is also extended to the officers and teachers in the benevolent institutions of the State; officers and teachers of the Ohio University; officers of the Ohio Penitentiary; ex-officers of the State; ex-officers of the General Assembly, and to the widows of deceased ex-members and ex-officers of the General Assembly and ex-State officers.

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1. Not more than two books can be taken from the Library by the same person at the same time, and no additional books may be taken out until they are returned.

2. All books taken from the Library must be returned within two weeks, and the same books can not be taken out again by the same party until the expiration of two days thereafter.

3. All books of reference, and others of rare and peculiar value, are not intended for circulation, but must be consulted in the Library.

4. Valuable illustrated works may not be taken out, used, nor handled for mere amusement.

5. No person is allowed to take any book from the alcove, nor from the tables, without permission, and no book can be taken from the Library without a memorandum thereof upon the record by the Librarian or Assistant.

6. Any person returning books to the Library must report the same to the Librarian or Assistant, who will cancel them upon the record.

7. All persons who lose, or permit books to be damaged while in their possession, must pay for or replace them.

8. All copying from books in the Library must be done with pencil; leaves must not be turned down, and no marks of any kind made on the margins.

9. Any person having the legal right to take books from the Library, who shall give an order for, or furnish books to any other person not having such right, to be used by such other person, shall thereby forfeit his or her own privileges.

10. Members and officers of the General Assembly shall return all books in their possession four days before the adjournment of the session; and it shall be the duty of the Librarian to report to the Senate or House of Representatives, the names of any officers or members who shall fail to comply with the foregoing requirement.

11. Loud talking and smoking strictly forbidden.

ERRATA.

On page 11, it was intended to have a head-line in Capital Letters over paragraph 6, to read: Comparative statement.

The 6th paragraph, on page 11, should read as follows:

Annual appropriations and expenditures of some leading State Libraries *are* here given, that comparison may be made with Ohio.

On page 12, the footing of the appropriations for the Ohio State Library, for 1890, should show \$6,405, instead of the total as carried out on said page.

On*page 12, the heading—Salaries of State Librarians and their Staffs in a number of States—should be in Capital Letters.

On page 20, the last sentence of the first paragraph should read—

The "dictionary plan," that is, all the entries, whether authors, titles, or subjects, arranged in one alphabetical series, is suggested.

On page 20, the paragraph beginning with the sentence—Your attention is called to the crowded condition of many of the alcoves—should have preceded the paragraph immediately above it.
